Priority Area 1: Teaching and Learning

Thursday, April 17, 2025, has been approved by the school board for use as a makeup day.

Due to an unusually high number of weather-related closures during the 2024-2025 school year, the district has exceeded its allotted hours for such absences. Per Missouri state requirements, school districts must make up a total of 60 instructional hours. After the first 36 hours of closures, only half of the remaining missed hours must be made up until reaching the 60-hour threshold.

While our district strategically builds extra instructional hours into the calendar to mitigate weather-related disruptions, the number of closures this year has exceeded those reserves, necessitating the addition of an extra makeup day.

The makeup day will follow a standard PLC early release schedule, ensuring consistency for students, staff, and families:

- Elementary School: 8:00 AM 2:20 PM

Special Recognitions

We would like to give a huge thank you to **Tina Weber** and our transportation department for their outstanding efforts on January 21st, when we faced extreme cold temperatures. Their proactive approach to pre-treating our school buses ensured all routes ran smoothly. In contrast, a neighboring district had to cancel school due to 40% of their buses failing to start. We deeply appreciate our transportation team's dedication to student safety and reliability.

Additionally, we successfully showcased our new video board, scoreboard, scorer's table, and sound system at recent home basketball games. I received multiple compliments on these improvements.

Potential Fundraising Activity

Derick Kerr reached out with a request to use the high school parking lot on September 13th for a car show. This event will raise funds to help cover school lunch costs. Details of the event will be announced as the plans are finalized.

Potential Stellar Virtual Partnership

There are currently five other school districts in Missouri that host a virtual school setting for students. On February 14th, Mrs. Greubel and I met with representatives from Stellar Virtual to explore a potential partnership for the 2025-2026 school year. This opportunity is being considered as a strategic financial decision to benefit our district while reinforcing our unwavering commitment to in-person learning.

We want to be clear—our district will never promote virtual learning as a replacement for in-seat instruction. We firmly believe that the best educational experience comes from direct engagement with teachers and peers in a traditional classroom setting. This potential partnership would not shift our own students to a virtual platform but would instead allow us to host students from outside our district in a virtual program facilitated by Stellar Virtual.

Stellar Virtual currently provides virtual learning services in three other states and is looking to expand into Missouri. By partnering with our district, Stellar Virtual would establish a presence in the state while generating additional revenue to support our schools.

Potential Benefits to the District:

•Generating over \$200,000 annually in additional state revenue on an annual basis

•Enhancing teacher salaries by allocating these additional funds to increase teacher's salaries and address the financial impact of Senate Bill 727

This proposal will be reviewed by the Board at the March 20th board meeting for further discussion and potential approval.


